| 5. | How does Caleb remind Joshua of Moses' promise regarding his inheritance, in Joshua 14.6-9? How does Caleb's faith and determination inspire confidence in God's faithfulness to fulfill his | | |

| 6. | Consider Caleb's recounting of his actions and attitudes during the reconnaissance of the land forty-five years earlier, as described in verses 7-9. How does Caleb's obedience and faithfulness contrast with the fear and rebellion of the other Israelite spies? |
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| 7. | Reflect on Caleb's request for the hill country of Hebron as his inheritance, as described in verses 10-12. How does Caleb's desire for the land of Hebron reflect his confidence in God's promise and his readiness to face the challenges ahead? |
| 8. | Discuss the significance of Caleb's faith and perseverance in claiming his inheritance, as described in verses 13-15. How does God reward Caleb's faithfulness by granting him possession of the land he desired? |
| 9. | How does the psalmist describe the nation's affliction and humiliation, in Psalm 44.20-22? What emotions and sentiments does the psalmist express in response to this suffering, and how does he appeal to God for help and deliverance? |
| 10. | Consider the psalmist's plea for God's intervention and redemption in verses 23-26. How does the psalmist appeal to God's covenant faithfulness and steadfast love as grounds for his request for deliverance from their enemies? |
| 11. | Reflect on the psalmist's final appeal for God to rise up and redeem his people, as described in verses 23-26. How does the psalmist express confidence in God's power and sovereignty to bring about salvation and vindication for his people? |
| 12. | How does Proverbs 14:3 highlight the folly of a person's speech and the importance of guarding one's lips in maintaining integrity and avoiding harm? |

| 13. | What prompts the disciples to ask Jesus to teach them to pray, Luke 11.1-4? How does Jesus respond to their request by teaching them the model prayer, also known as the Lord's Prayer? |
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| 14. | Reflect on the parable of the friend at midnight, as described in verses 5-8. What does Jesus teach about persistence in prayer and the willingness of God to respond to our needs when we persistently seek him? |
| 15. | Consider Jesus' teaching on asking, seeking, and knocking in verses 9-13. How does Jesus encourage his followers to be bold and persistent in their prayers, trusting in God's goodness and willingness to give good gifts to his children? |
| 16. | Reflect on the contrast between light and darkness in verses 14-23. How does Jesus warn against the dangers of spiritual blindness and the need for inner purity and light to overcome darkness and evil? |
